An Introduction to Pastor Ken Osborne

This spring, Pat Turner, Chip Cockerham, and I had the pleasure of interviewing the pastors who showed an interest in becoming Churchville Presbyterian Church's interim pastor. All of the candidates we interviewed were wonderful pastors with terrific gifts to share with their congregations. However, the committee unanimously chose to invite one pastor to serve our church as its interim pastor. He accepted our invitation, and Session agreed with our choice. Therefore, it is my pleasure to introduce to you our interim pastor, Rev. Kenneth Osborne, who has told me he prefers to be called, Ken. Ken comes to us after serving as Interim Pastor at Fallston Presbyterian Church. He currently lives in Lancaster, PA with his wife, who is also a pastor. He will be commuting to Churchville Presbyterian Church from Lancaster.

I realize we will all have plenty of time to get to know Pastor Ken over the next weeks and months ahead. However, as a preview to meeting the man in person, I have compiled some of Ken's own words from the "Personal Information Form" that he provided our Interim Pastor Committee. In response to the question asking of his leadership style, Ken says that he bases his leadership style on the wisdom of the Interim Pastor at his first church, which is, "Just love them; you'll have a good time." He feels that his focus as Interim Pastor is to enable and support the leaders of the church he is serving. He looks for the gifts of the congregation and works to help the congregation use their gifts. He feels that, "It is as we come together, uniting our gifts under the wisdom and guidance of the Holy Spirit, that the work of the church of Jesus Christ can best be accomplished."

In response to the question asking what he views as the biggest theological issue currently facing the church and society, Ken stated that he feels that the biggest problem is not a lack of love for Jesus Christ. Instead, it is a lack of love for each other. He writes, "The lack of love for one another is the biggest issue facing God's church today. How can we proclaim our love for God when we refuse to love one another?" Ken feels one of the greatest commandments is, "You shall love your Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength." The second greatest commandment is, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." He feels that we show our love for God when we truly love one another. He writes, "What a message we proclaim to those still seeking God when they witness the love we have for one another."

Finally, I thought everyone would benefit from reading parts of Ken's statement of faith as it was reported to those of us on the committee. Here are more of Ken's words, "I believe in God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. Actually, I believe it's all about God. In the beginning, God created, and we've been trying to understand it all ever since. Amazingly, God chose us 'out of all the peoples on Earth to be His people, His treasured possession.'

Clerk's Report: Bob Muse

1. Minutes of the 08 June 2011 Regular Session meeting and the 19 June 2011 Special Congregational Meeting were presented for approval. Session approved.
2. Communion was served by Intinction on 3 July 2011.
3. Pulpit Supply for July is listed as follows: 3 July: Rev. Lonna Smith; 10 July: Inquirer Jeff Snodgrass; 17 July: Inquirer Jeff Snodgrass; 24 July: David Petr and Inquirer Jeff Snodgrass; 31 July: Rev. Jim Riddell. The Session voted to offer their great appreciation to the above-named individuals for providing the pulpit supply to Churchville Presbyterian Church for the month of July.
4. Excerpts from the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA):
 - a. If an employee performs certain job duties and is paid on a "salary basis", the employee is then considered "exempt" from the FLSA's requirements, freeing you from obligations concerning the minimum wage or overtime. However, even if you initially classify employees correctly, you must continue to treat them as exempt on an ongoing basis. Many common practices, such as the tracking of hours worked or not giving paid sick days, may affect whether the employee is considered to be paid on a salary basis and, therefore, can adversely impact the exemption classification.
 - b. Generally, a non-exempt employee is a support staff position - administrative assistants (secretaries), bookkeepers, and custodians.
 - c. Musicians, business administrators, Christian educators, and pastors are exempt from this requirement of tracking hours worked.
 - d. Employers that require exempt employees to account for their work time on an hourly basis may jeopardize the status of their employees if the accounting has the effect of treating them like hourly workers. If you are not paying them on a "salary basis" as defined by the FLSA, you may owe up to three years of back pay and even be personally liable for penalties.
 - e. Instead of focusing on the number of hours an employee works or his starting time, you are better advised to focus on the employee's job requirements and output (completed work).

After reading these excerpts and having some discussion, the Session voted to retract their action taken at the 11 May 2011 Session meeting requiring that a record of weekly hours worked be kept by staff members and a copy placed in Bob Muse's mailbox (Personnel Committee Chairperson) at the end of each month.

5. A memo from Carol McMonagle (Administrative Assistant) pointed out the need for something to put floral arrangements and plants on when there is a funeral at CPC. The floor, windowsills, and piano have been used. Carol has been given information regarding a five-pack of floral stands that funeral homes use, and a church member has agreed to pay the cost. Session approved obtaining the stands.

Interim Pastor Nominating Committee Report: Pat Turner, Elizabeth Turney, Chip Cockerham

The Interim Pastor (Ken Osborne) was introduced. He provided his background and said that he lives in Lancaster, PA. The Interim Contract was signed by the Clerk of Session, and it was agreed that 4 August 2011 will be his starting date at Churchville. Session approved.

Personnel Committee Report: Bob Muse

The Committee interviewed three candidates for the position of Director of Music Ministry at CPC and selected Marthea Proudfoot. She will be introduced to the congregation on July 24, 2011. Marthea's first work day will be September 1, 2011. Session approved.

Day Care Board: Elizabeth Turney

The Board recommends that the Personnel Committee assist them with some issues that need to be addressed at the Day Care.

An Open Letter to the Congregation:

Dear Friends: Gene and I still feel great sadness and hurt in the loss of Marilyn Rudolph. Surely there had to be a better way to resolve conflict in the church than the intentional provocation that some, if not all, knew would lead to the loss of our choir director.

Would it have been different if just one elder had sung in the choir? If just one elder had participated with Marilyn in the music program? Would that person have stopped the declarations against her husband? Would that person have stood up and said, "No! We don't work like that!" - much the way the angel of the Lord spoke to Abraham on Mount Moriah?

Gene and I are still stunned by that whole scenario, wondering how it could have happened. With the benefit of hindsight, would those involved "drop their knives"? Or do it again? (The reference is from Lloyd Umbarger's message June 26th from Genesis 22.) Please! Not again. There is help for such times. There are counselors trained in Conflict Management in the Church.

It's easy for us to raise questions. We're not on boards. We're out of the loop. We didn't get a message to be at the Session meeting. But we do sing in the choir, and have for more than fifty years. Marilyn didn't simply fill a position. She was a wonderful director and teacher - probably the best ever. More than that, she's our friend in Christ, and she was wounded by the church she loved.

With an interim minister ready to go and a choir director selected, let's be careful with this new thing the Lord is doing. There is a better way to resolve conflict. Get on your knees if you have to, but please find it.

MD State Highway Administration



We are pleased to inform you that as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, the Maryland State Highway Administration will be performing roadway patching, milling, and resurfacing operations on MD 22 (Churchville Road) from West of MD 136 (Calvary Road) to MD 155 (Level Road). This project will begin on or after Sunday, August 7, 2011. We anticipate the project should be completed by late September, weather permitting. All road work will be performed at night by Gray and Son of Timonium, Maryland, between the hours of 9:00 PM and 5:00 AM, Sunday through Thursday.

We appreciate your patience during the construction period. For your safety and the safety of the traveling public, please be aware that this work will utilize flagging operations and lane shifts for traffic control. Please be aware of these alterations and use caution when entering and exiting businesses/driveways within the work zone.

Words for Wellness

I hope you have been enjoying your summer so far, keeping busy with family and friends, taking good care of your health, and "catching some rays", using plenty of sun-screen, of course.

As we have promised, the Stephen Ministers and I have been calling on members and caring for the spiritual health of our congregation, since our pastor retired. We will continue to care for you throughout the summer, up to and including when our Interim pastor begins his tenure at CPC. Please don't hesitate to call upon us as needed.

Health Tips/Preventive Medicine:



I found a few interesting tips for all of us to consider to keep us "Steady on our Feet": Did you know that having poor balance is a health risk? Falls are the leading cause of hospital admissions for people over 65, with one in three experiencing a fall each year. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 20% – 30 % of falls result in lacerations, hip fractures, and head traumas, with hospital bills averaging \$18,000 per patient. It's important to understand that the risk of falling isn't caused just by aging, but is an effect of illnesses common in older adults. If you have diabetes, are overweight, or have hypertension (high blood pressure), there is a greater risk for a fall. If you feel unsteady on your feet, or someone notices that you seem wobbly, check with your doctor to evaluate your risk factors.

There are other strategies to bolster balance, which include yoga (we'll start again at CPC in September), tai chi (if anyone knows of a class, some of us would like to try it), and low-impact dancing (OK, let's do some line-dancing at any of the Senior Centers). For home safety, remove throw rugs and fix slippery surfaces to avoid missteps and falls.

Always keep a diligent eye on your health care, and be proactive in self-care. Remember, *an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure*. This tenant still holds true.

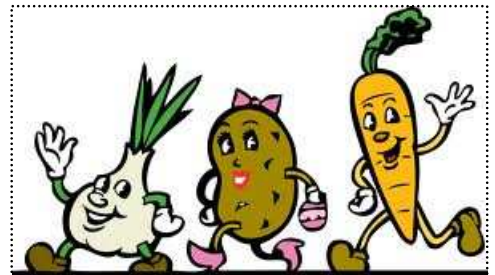

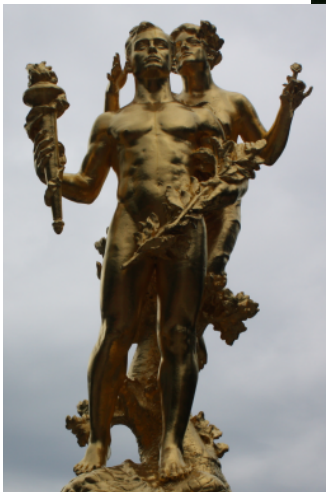
Carol's Corner

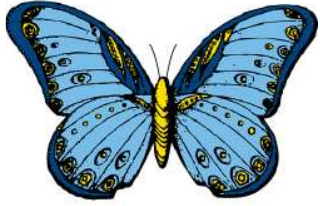
